The team at **Canterbury Farm**, led by trainers **Caitlyn Shiels** and **Greg Franklin** of Hampshire, Illinois, enjoyed a successful competition during week two of the **Great Lakes Equestrian Festival** in Traverse City, Michigan. **Marisa Malevitis** and **Cydelle** claimed the Low Adult Hunter Championship title as well as a victory in the Low Adult Hunter Classic, while other top placings included **Michelle Durpetti** riding **Lucca** in the Amateur-Owner Hunter division, **Alexa Maiello** riding **Chant de Paix** in the 0.85m Jumpers, and **Molly Zygmont** aboard **Hillcrest Songbird**, taking the Reserve Championship in the II-and-Under Equitation division.

Canadian Olympian **Beth Underhill** won the \$50,000 Brookstreet Grand Prix at the **Ottawa National Horse Show** held in Ottawa, Ontario, Canada. Beth and **Count Me In**, a 10-year-old Hanoverian gelding owned by **Sandy Lupton**, were double clear over the track set by 2016 Rio Olympic course designer **Guilherme Jorge** on the expansive grass grand prix field at **Wesley Clover Parks**. From the original 31-horse starting field, seven advanced to the jump-off where Beth, as the final challenger on course, posted the winning time of 39.23 seconds to edge out **Amy Millar**, who had stopped the clock in 39.93 seconds riding her 2016 Rio Olympic mount, **Heros**.

Matthew Metell of Wellington, Florida, won back-to-back grand prix classes during the first two weeks of the six-week Vermont Summer Festival in East Dorset, Vermont. Even more impressive, Matthew was making his grand prix debut when he won the \$30,000 Battenkill Grand Prix, presented by The Equinox Resort. Making it two for two a week later in the \$30,000 Vermont Summer Special Grand Prix, Matthew can lay claim to a perfect record, having won every grand prix class he has entered. "She's easier and better than I ever thought she could be," said Matthew, 27, of his winning mount, Donchalant, a 9-year-old Dutch Warmblood mare (Larino x Amaretto I) owned by Wolver Hollow. "She feels so careful in the ring. She's obviously more than we could have ever hoped for."



Eric Lamaze and Fine Lady 5 Photo by Starting Gate Communications Canadian Olympic gold, silver and bronze medalist Eric Lamaze became the first rider to reach \$5 million in career earnings at Spruce Meadows in Calgary, Canada. Eric, who has sat atop the all-time money won leaderboard for several years, surpassed the \$5 million mark with his third-place finish in the \$500,000 Atco Queen Elizabeth II Cup riding **Fine Lady 5** during the **Spruce Meadows** North American Tournament, bringing his all-time prize money earnings to \$5,069.442. Most riders can only dream of winning \$5 million in prize money in their lifetime, so to do it at a single venue is truly a remarkable accomplishment.

Winning at Spruce Meadows is a huge accomplishment in itself, but two-time Canadian Olympian Tiffany Foster captured back-to-back victories in the International Ring at the CSI5* Spruce Meadows North American Tournament in Calgary, Alberta, Canada. On Friday, July 7, Tiffany topped the \$35,000 1.50m Pepsi Challenge riding Caipiranja, a 9-year-old black Belgian Sport Horse mare (Taran de la Pomme x Darco) owned by Artisan Farms LLC. The following day, she returned to successfully defend her title in the \$90,000 1.50m Imperial Winning Round riding Brighton, an 11-year-old Dutch Warmblood gelding (Contender II x Quick Star) also owned by Andy and Carlene Ziegler's Artisan Farms LLC. One of 11 entries from the 30-horse starting field to advance to the jump-off, Tiffany and Brighton crossed the timers in 39.90 seconds to hold off three-time U.S. Olympic team medalist McLain Ward, who finished second in 40.64 seconds riding HH Carlos Z.
