They also were members of the U.S. Para Dressage team that won the Nations Cup over the Canadian team. "We all knew it was in him, but seeing how consistent he was in such a big, electric atmosphere was great," Sydney said. "He's completely embraced his job and enjoys it. It's a more special partnership than I can describe with words." Top U.S. show jumper Georgina Bloomberg purchased All In One in July to help support Sydney in her goal to be selected for the U.S. team at the 2020 Tokyo Paralympic Games. "It's fantastic to see Sydney doing

so well with All In One," Georgina said. "I'm extremely proud to be part of her journey. There's no one who loves representing the United States more than Sydney. She's always in red, white and blue, and I'm thrilled she was able to help the U.S. Para Dressage team secure a victory in addition to having such a great show as an individual."

Sloane, 31, rode Chippendale's Boy DZ, a 10-year-old Zangersheide gelding owned by The Springledge Group, to a five-fault score for the U.S. team, which finished eighth in the FEI Jumping Nations Cup CSIO5\* Calgary, the richest Nations Cup in North America.

"Sloane had a great round," said U.S. Chef d'Equipe Robert Ridland. "She really rode the pants off that horse. It's a new combination, and they did a really good job." Sloane operates Springledge, a training, sales and retirement farm in The Plains, Virginia. The former equitation star is a 2011 graduate from Drew University (New Jersey) and has worked with top trainers such as John and Beezie Madden, Beacon Hill Show Stables, Johnny and Kitty Barker, and Heritage Farm.
