"I was 10th place here last year and third the year before, so I was a little bit hungry to get back in the ring here," said Sam, who claimed the ASPCA Maclay National Championship in 2018. Canadian Olympic gold medalist Eric Lamaze made a triumphant return to the CSI4*-W Royal Horse Show in Toronto, Ontario, claiming the Leading International Rider

and Leading Canadian Rider titles, both presented by GroupBy, in his first visit to the prestigious show since 2011. Eric and his 2016 Rio Olympic individual bronze medal mount, Fine Lady 5, won the \$37,000 McKee Family International Challenge before also finishing second in Thursday night's \$85,000 Big Ben International Challenge and second in the \$50,000 Canadian Open on Friday night. For her consistent performances throughout the week, Fine Lady 5, owned by Artisan Farms and Torrey Pines Stables, was recognized with the Leading Canadian Horse Award, presented by Lothlorien Farm.

Victory in the extremely popular \$20,000 Horseware Indoor Eventing Challenge at the Royal Horse Show in Toronto, Canada, went to Karl Slezak and his 2019 Pan American Games partner, Fernhill Wishes. Karl and the 10-year-old Irish Sport Horse gelding, owned by Kirk Hoppner and the rider, sat in third place following the opening round of competition on Friday night but a heart-pounding round in front of a sold-out crowd the following evening catapulted them to the top of the leaderboard. Fellow Canadian Kendal Lehari held the lead coming into Saturday night's final riding Totally Frank but a cumulative time over the two rounds left the pair in second place while third place went to Toronto's own Brandon McMechan riding Oscar's Wild. Once again, Mark Phillips designed the courses, which incorporated a mix of cross-country obstacles and traditional show jumping fences.

Canadian Olympian Beth Underhill was crowned the 2019 Canadian Show Jumping Champion following two nights of competition during opening weekend of the Royal Horse Show in Toronto, Canada. The \$125,000 Henry Equestrian Canadian Show Jumping Championship was held over three rounds, with Beth's consistent performances earning her the win aboard Count Me In, a 12-yearold Hanoverian gelding (Count Grannus x Sherlock Holmes) owned by Sandy Lupton and Robert Caswell. "It means the world to me," said Beth, 57, of her victory. "It was fantastic to compete in front of a sold-out crowd, and you really, really felt it. As a rider, you step into that ring and there's nothing like it. It's why we do this. It was a wonderful start to the week."

An impressive list of officials for the 2020 FEI Dressage World Cup™ Final has been announced by Las Vegas Events, Inc., producer of the 2020 FEI World Cup™ Finals. The world's elite horses and riders will return to the Thomas & Mack Center in Las Vegas, Nevada, April 1-19, 2020, to compete for top honors in both the 2020 FEI Dressage World Cup™ Final and 2020 Longines FEI Jumping World Cup™ Final. Heading the list of dressage officials is Anne Gribbons of the U.S.A., who will be president of the ground jury. Joining her will be ground jury members Irina Maknami of Russia, Elke Ebert of Germany, Raphaël Saleh of France, Eddy De Wolff of The Netherlands, Susanne Baarup of Denmark and Peter Storr of Great Britain. First reserve will be Maria Colliander of Finland, with Susie Hoevenaars of Australia

as second reserve (non-traveling). The Judges Supervisory Panel (JSP) will consist of Henk van Bergen of The Netherlands, Linda Zang of the U.S.A., and Mary Seefried of Australia. Maribel Alonso of Mexico will be the foreign technical delegate. The Finals will be managed, as was the case for the Finals' previous appearances in Las Vegas in 2005, 2007, 2009 and 2015, by Glenda McElroy of Cornerstone Event Management.
