Laura Kraut finally added the President's Cup title to her riding resume at the 61st annual Washington International Horse Show (WIHS), presented by MARS Equestrian™. Riding Fleurette, Laura jumped to victory in the \$136,300 Longines FEI Jumping World Cup™ Washington, presented by Events DC for the President's Cup, on the final night of the six-day horse show in the heart of Washington, D.C. "It's been a class that I wanted to win for many, many years," said the Olympic team gold medalist who placed fifth in the 2018 class riding Confu. "I think I've been jumping in the international division at WIHS since the late 80s. I've had quite a few seconds and thirds and fourths, but the win just always seemed to elude me. I said at the beginning of the week, I think this is going to be my week." Laura first competed at WIHS in 1978 in the pony hunter divisions.

Sam joked that his preparation for this year's win began immediately after the class last year. "I was 10th place here last year and third the year before, so I was a little bit hungry to get back in the ring here," said Sam, who claimed the ASPCA Maclay National Championship in 2018. Canadian Olympic gold medalist Eric Lamaze made a triumphant return to the CSI4*-W Royal Horse Show in Toronto, Ontario, claiming the Leading International Rider

Eric and his 2016 Rio Olympic individual bronze medal mount, Fine Lady 5, won the \$37,000 McKee Family International Challenge before also finishing second in Thursday night's \$85,000 Big Ben International Challenge and second in the \$50,000 Canadian Open on Friday night. For her consistent performances throughout the week, Fine Lady 5, owned by Artisan Farms and Torrey Pines Stables, was recognized with the Leading Canadian Horse Award, presented by Lothlorien Farm.

Victory in the extremely popular \$20,000 Horseware Indoor Eventing Challenge at the Royal Horse Show in Toronto, Canada, went to Karl Slezak and his 2019 Pan American Games partner, Fernhill Wishes. Karl and the 10-year-old Irish Sport Horse gelding, owned by Kirk Hoppner and the rider, sat in third place following the opening round of competition on Friday night but a heart-pounding round in front of a sold-out crowd the following evening catapulted them to the top of the leaderboard. Fellow Canadian Kendal Lehari held the lead coming into Saturday night's final riding Totally Frank but a cumulative time over the two rounds left the pair in second place while third place went to Toronto's own Brandon McMechan riding Oscar's Wild. Once again, Mark Phillips designed the courses, which incorporated a mix of cross-country obstacles and traditional show jumping fences.

Canadian Olympian Beth Underhill was crowned the 2019 Canadian Show Jumping Champion following two nights of competition during opening weekend of the Royal Horse Show in Toronto, Canada. The \$125,000 Henry Equestrian Canadian Show Jumping Championship was held over three rounds, with Beth's consistent performances earning her the win aboard Count Me In, a 12-yearold Hanoverian gelding (Count Grannus x Sherlock Holmes) owned by Sandy Lupton and Robert Caswell. "It means the world to me," said Beth, 57, of her victory. "It was fantastic to compete in front of a sold-out crowd, and you really, really felt it. As a rider, you step into that ring and there's nothing like it. It's why we do this. It was a wonderful start to the week."
