Longines FEI Jumping World Cup™, Toronto (CAN) CSI5*-W: Two 21-year-old Americans made their Toronto debuts more than memorable when jumping into a three-way decider for the World Cup qualifier against a US-based Irishman whose years number more than the sum of both their ages. Skylar Wireman was first in to set the pace with her New York MLSJ winner Barclino B, and the pair crossed the line in 42.08 seconds to set the early target. Mimi Gochman and Inclen BH had an unfortunate stumble and then went off course for guaranteed third, leaving the door open for the super experienced Swail to find the winning track with Casturano, which he did when crossing the line 0.84 seconds faster than Wireman. The win boosted Swail up to the top of the NAL standings on 38 points, 11 clear of fellow Irishman and Washington runner-up Daniel Coyle. Wireman's Toronto runner-up spot boosted her to fourth, a single point ahead of Washington winner Laura Kraut and Williamsburg number one Kent Farrington, tied in fifth.
